# PROJECT ACTIVITY UPDATE SMART CITIES HEALTHY KIDS (SPHERU O SASKATOON) CO

The Smart Cities, Healthy Kids study is examining how urban planning and design can be used to encourage children to be more physically active, thus slowing the rise in childhood obesity. Data collection is well under way with five observers using the NALP (Neighbourhood Active Living Potential) tool to assess the active living potential of 59 Saskatoon neighbourhoods. Now entering the second phase of the data collection, the Irvine-Minnesota Inventory in 35 Saskatoon neighbourhoods is being implemented, which collects data regarding elements in the built environment and how they explicitly address the needs of pedestrians and cyclists. ## Osteoporosis Research entering data collection phase (SPHERU Regina)

Osteoporosis care gap among the elderly: From screening to evidencebased management looks at preventative actions and management strategies following the assessment of an individual's bone status. During the Fall of 2009 data collection will begin, which will provide the necessary foundation that will lead to improvements in osteoporosis diagnosis, management, and prevention. ### Northern Project Captures a Year in the Life (SPHERU Prince Albert)

Photovoice, a method that involves providing participants with cameras to record and discuss meaningful images, is being used in the *Tools 2- Community health and wellness indicators reflecting daily life in Saskatchewan's isolated far North: Implications for Program Planning and Evaluation* project in northern Saskatchewan. Community Research Assistants in Black Lake and Fond du Lac will each work with 10 participants, using photos to capture "A year in the life..."

#### WHO WE ARE

SPHERU is an interdisciplinary team of population health researchers from the Universities of Regina and Saskatchewan with sites in Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert. Established in 1999 and funded by the Saskatchewan Health Research Foundation, with additional project specific funding provided by other provincial and national health research funding agencies, SPHERU is the first bi-university research unit of its kind in Saskatchewan.

of community members. Beginning in summer 2009 participants will be part of a 6-8 week seasonal data collection cycle, taking pictures that both show what they feel is important about their food, housing, culture, and environment to keep their community healthy, along with what they feel are the threats and facilitators in these areas. The project builds on an earlier CIHR funded project that developed a new framework for community health and wellness and created the Community Health Indicators *Toolkit*. The photovoice project will help researchers, funders and policy makers to understand the lived experience of a selection of indicators from the toolkit.

SPHERU also conducts **Evaluation Research and promotes** health equity by addressing health disparities through policy relevant research.
