MLCN School is located 200 km to the nearest grocery store. The student population is 328. We have three school cooks who prepare an average of 200 meals per day both breakfast and lunch. At MLCN we strive to continue improving our food program with the help of community Growcer.








Community Growcer provides us with fresh greens every week.
